HEALTHY BUSINESS



On September 14th, employees from Cheniere gathered with local and state leaders to dedicate the Johnson Bayou Rural Health Clinic to the community. The health care center will provide much needed urgent and preventative care to our neighbors. In addition to the practical implications of the clinic, the project illustrates what can be accomplished when various members of the community listen, align their resources, and work together.

Cheniere learned of the need for additional health care in the area when we started development of our LNG facilities. Conversations

with residents in the area revealed that some had to drive over 40 miles to get prescriptions refilled or to see a nurse for a routine checkup. The decision to provide resources to build and initially operate the clinic facility was a very simple one for our Company.

We spent time looking for an ideal location for the clinic, and we found a parcel of land that offered accessibility to residents traveling from several directions. The land was owned by the Stream family. When we contacted them, they recognized the urgent need and enthusiastically donated the land for the clinic.

The Police Jury moved the project forward by forming the Lower Cameron Hospital Service District Number 2. The district, run by a five member board, is the owner of the clinic and, as such, is charged with the management of the facility. The board has worked tirelessly to finalize the design,

oversee construction and secure management for the facility. Like any new business, it will take a few years to cement a client base to become self sufficient, and Cheniere will provide funding for the startup years to cover most operating costs.

Cheniere appreciates the opportunity to collaborate on projects like this with our neighbors. As with all of our outreach programs, Cheniere views the development of this clinic as part of our social responsibility and a good business decision. Our success depends on the support of our host communities, and we believe that you should be able to rely on us.

CHENIERE BRINGS JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT® PROGRAM TO CAMERON PARISH

Starting in October, all kindergarten through fifth grade classes in Cameron Parish will be participating in the Junior Achievement program.

"This is a first for Cameron Parish and Junior Achievement," stated Marsha Landry, Executive Director of Junior Achievement of Southwest Louisiana. "We are so pleased to be able to bring our programs into the four Cameron Parish Schools: Grand Lake, Hackberry, Johnson Bayou and South Cameron."

The Junior Achievement program provides an opportunity for children of all ages to expand their knowledge of, and encourage their involvement in the local, state, and national communities. There are six curriculum "themes" in the elementary school program, which were created in conjunction with the standards set forth by the Louisiana Department of Education:

- **Ourselves®** teaches students about economics. It focuses on defining and identifying money, teamwork, the importance and process of saving money, and the value of work and subsequent giving.
- **In Our Families®**, the link between families and their communities is explored. Children will participate in activities that help them

identify the difference between a "want" and a "need", and about the importance of jobs and interdependence.

- Theme three of the program is **Our Community®**, which shows students how people work together in a community to make it a success, including job opportunities, production and the ways in which money flows through a community's economy.
- The curriculum for **Our City®** illustrates a connection between various jobs within the community and the development and success of the city.
- **Our Region®** distinguishes between economic regions of the city, parish, state and country, and the unique resources found in each of those communities.
- Finally, **Our Nation®** features business operations in the U.S., including job searching, methods of production, human resources, and the key elements of a business plan

TERMINAL UPDATE

The Sabine Pass LNG regasification terminal is scheduled to be operational in the second quarter of 2008. It will have a send out capacity of 4 Bcf/d when complete and is being constructed in two phases. As of September 1, the first phase of the terminal project was over 85% complete. On August 8th, the site's third LNG storage tank roof was raised. Each tank on site will have a storage capacity of 160,000 m3, enough natural gas to serve the state of Louisiana for an entire day.

In the last edition of LNG Channel, you learned that Cheniere's Sabine Pass employees celebrated a major safety milestone in reaching 2 million man-hours without a lost time incident. On June 25th, the group reached the 3 million man-hour mark! This exciting accomplishment was possible because of the diligence and commitment to safety shared by all contractors and employees on site. Congratulations on this accomplishment!

PIPELINE UPDATE



The Sabine Pass and Creole Trail pipeline construction is continuing on schedule for completion in the second quarter of 2008. The pipeline construction will generate approximately \$9 million in state and parish level sales taxes for 2007 and 2008. Some of these taxes are collected from the fuel, lodging and meals purchased by the 1000 plus person construction workforce. A larger portion of the sales tax results from the pipe and equipment purchases. Long term, Cameron, Calcasieu and Beauregard Parishes will continue to benefit from millions of dollars annually in property tax revenues.



Pipelines serve as an economic, efficient and safe means of transporting natural gas from sources of supply to natural gas consumers. Because natural gas will soon be flowing through Cheniere's Sabine Pass and Creole Trail pipelines, it is important that our neighbors know where the pipelines are located, and more generally, know how to detect a natural gas leak and what to do in case of an emergency.

The pipelines will run 94 miles from the Sabine Pass LNG terminal through Cameron, Calcasieu and Beauregard Parishes, connecting to several interstate pipelines. The pipeline path is marked with above ground pipeline markers like the ones pictured to the left.

A natural gas pipeline leak is easily detectable if one knows what to look for. Dead or discolored vegetation, frozen ground in warm weather, blowing dirt (for no apparent reason) and bubbling water or flames (indicating that the gas has ignited) can all be signs of a natural gas leak. Hissing, roaring or blowing sounds may also indicate a natural gas leak.

If you do suspect a leak:

- Immediately leave the area on foot and move to a safe location.
- Avoid any actions that may create a spark (lighting a cigarette, using a cell phone, starting an engine, etc.).
- Call Cheniere's emergency phone number (877-375-5002) or your local emergency responder (911) to give a description of the leak and its location.

Remember – Always call 811 before you dig!

WHAT IS THE JOHNSON BAYOU RURAL HEALTH CLINIC?

The Johnson Bayou Rural Health Clinic is a facility designed to provide minor emergency and health maintenance care to people in the Hackberry, Holly Beach and Johnson Bayou communities.

Where is the Johnson Bayou Rural Health Clinic located?

The clinic is located at 6240 Gulf Beach Highway, Cameron LA, 70631. It is a half mile east of Johnson Bayou High School.

What services will the clinic offer?

Health Services - The clinic will offer routine checkups and wellness programs, immunizations and minor emergency care. Although not a full service lab or pharmacy, the clinic will serve as a drop off and collection point for lab work and prescriptions. Dental services and KIDMED screening are also being proposed.

Community Meeting Room - In addition to health services, the clinic facility has a small meeting room that can be reserved on a first come, first served basis for community related meetings. To reserve this room, please call the clinic at 337-569-2245.



When will the clinic be in operation?

The clinic is scheduled to be open the week of November 5th. Be on the lookout in the coming weeks for ads in the Cameron Pilot, Southwest Daily News and Lake Charles American Press announcing that the clinic will be accepting patients.

How do I make an appointment to be seen at the clinic?

To make an appointment or check the clinic schedule, patients can call 337-569-2245. Clinic staff will also treat walk-in patients.

Does the clinic accept insurance?

The clinic will accept most insurance, along with Medicare and Medicaid. The clinic also accepts cash, checks and credit cards.

CAP UPDATE
